


## Class of 2024 Diploma Type


Class of 2024

\*J is on track to earn his Regents diploma this June. J shared that the following quote sums up his experiences. “The greatest lesson I learned this year is you can’t have one foot in your old life and one foot in your new life and expect change. You have to fully commit to the new life.” J transition to high school was challenging. He attended Nassau BOCES Career Prep for part of 9th grade and all of 10th and 11th. Over the course of these few years, J excelled in all areas (academically and social-emotionally). In 11th grade, J was selected to participate in a college readiness program at Hofstra University through a partnership with Career Prep. J advocated for himself to return to the district to graduate with his class. He has continued to make excellent progress including making the honor roll for first and second quarter.



# Analysis of Current Classified Students 2024-2025



## Summary of Classification by Grade

Grade	Number of Classified Students	% of Classified Students
CPSE-CSE	523	44.51%
New Entrant	209	17.79%
2nd Grade	85	7.23%
3rd Grade	70	5.96%

More students were classified in grades K-5 (25.96%) than in grades 6th-12th (11.74%).




Increase in severity of needs of students with disabilities in district



High School




# PRIMARY BUDGET DRIVERS 2025-2026

# PLANNED INITIATIVES



- Expanding capacity within our school based programs to meet the increasing needs of students
  - Create a committee of staff members (BCBA, Psychologists, Special Education Teachers) to identify opportunities for enhancement of small ratio classes
- Continued Professional Development for all district teacher aides
  - Partner with New York Therapy Placement Services to provide teacher aides with components of Registered Behavior Technician curriculum.

# PLANNED INITIATIVES



- Improve efficiency by increasing provision of services internally and decreasing reliance on contracted agencies
  - Hire 1 Occupational Therapist
  - Hire 1 Physical Therapist
  - Evaluate and restructure current model of provision of Parent Training and Counseling for Families
- Expanding implementation of an Orton-Gillingham approach to reading instruction within the 12:1:1 special classes.
- Continued training in Orton-Gillingham by providing the Associate Level training for select special education teachers.
