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## **About Our District**

The Levittown School District serves a diverse population of more than 6,500 students from the communities of Levittown, Seaford, and Wantagh. Located in central Nassau County on Long Island, the district lies approximately 30 miles east of Manhattan. It is composed of six elementary schools, two middle schools, and two high schools, and is proud to serve families in this established, suburban area.

## **District Mission**

The mission of the Levittown Public Schools is to develop knowledgeable, enthusiastic students who value learning and are prepared to meet the District's commitment to *Success for Every Student*. Through collaboration and meaningful partnerships, Levittown graduates will be critical thinkers and problem solvers, ethical and empathetic, civically engaged, effective communicators, and resilient and adaptable, ready to succeed in any post-secondary path they choose.

*As per the New York State Commissioner of Education's Regulations relating to School Counseling released in May 2017, the Levittown School District renews its commitment to developing a comprehensive Guidance Plan which addresses the needs of all students in grades Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup>.*

## **Guidance Department**

School Counselors are licensed professionals with advanced degrees in School Counseling, uniquely trained to support students' developmental needs. Through a comprehensive and personalized counseling program, they promote academic achievement, career readiness, and social-emotional well-being for every student.

Serving students in grades 6 through 12, School Counselors help guide academic decisions that align with each student's post-secondary goals, including college and career planning. They collaborate with faculty, staff, and administration to provide meaningful support and serve as a vital resource for students and families. Counselors encourage students to pursue academic challenges and engage in extracurricular opportunities that foster growth beyond the classroom.

Effective communication is central to the work of the Guidance Department. Counselors meet with students individually and in groups and offer workshops during the school day and in the evening to help students and families navigate academic, social, and personal challenges.

## **Supporting Student Success: A Comprehensive Approach to Achievement, Well-Being, and Collaboration**

### **Student Achievement**

The goal of every educator and counselor is to help students master the curriculum and graduate ready for college or career. Strong communication between home and school supports this goal and is fostered through consistent outreach and collaboration.

Student success also involves providing targeted support for those who continue to face challenges. This may include peer tutoring, student partnerships, or other resources tailored to individual needs. Recognizing that students learn in different ways, a variety of strategies are offered to help every student succeed.

### **Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)**

Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) helps students of all ages develop the skills to manage emotions, set goals, show empathy, build relationships, and make responsible decisions.

Levittown Public Schools integrates SEL into daily practice through programs that promote kindness, empathy, and personal responsibility, such as RISE, Caught Being Kind, and Terrific Kids. Sixth-grade students also participate in *Middle School 101*, a five-week program that prepares them for the transition to middle school. Topics include managing stress, developing empathy, and supporting peers.

Counselors and support staff deliver this instruction, while teachers reinforce the lessons in the classroom, creating a coordinated approach to student well-being.

### **Student Intervention**

Students may face barriers to learning, including issues at home, peer conflicts, or learning difficulties. When these challenges arise, School Counselors provide in-school support such as individual counseling, crisis intervention, or referrals to the Student Support Team (SST) or Committee on Special Education (CSE).

When needed, referrals are made to outside agencies for additional services, including mental health support or a PINS (Persons In Need of Supervision) petition. All interventions aim to address student needs and promote long-term success.

### **Collaboration with Professionals and Community Agencies**

The success of the School Counseling program depends on strong collaboration with school staff and community partners. Counselors coordinate regularly with:

- District and building administrators
- Teachers and faculty
- School psychologists and social workers
- Community agencies, including YES Community Counseling Center, Northwell Health, Nassau County Child Protective Services, the PINS Diversion Program, SPOA, and others as needed

This collaborative approach ensures students and families have access to the resources and support they need.

## **Grades 6-12**

## College and Career Planning

The secondary school counseling program prepares students for success beyond their time in the Levittown School District by educating students and families about academic requirements and providing meaningful school-to-work experiences. Counselors support students at every stage to ensure a smooth transition from middle school through high school to college, the military, or the workforce.

Counselors work with students to create personalized schedules aligned with New York State and local standards. Career awareness begins in middle school with tools like Naviance and resources to explore future paths. Middle school counselors also organize College and Career Weeks to introduce a range of educational and career options.

At the high school level, students participate in post-secondary fairs, receive application support, and connect with representatives from colleges, vocational programs, and career fields. This comprehensive approach equips students with the knowledge and resources needed to confidently plan their next steps.

## **Grades K–5 Guidance Plan**

### **Program Objectives for Students in Grades K–5**

#### **Objective 1: Support Student Engagement**

*Goal:*

Students will actively participate in educational programs and demonstrate progress, measured through teacher observations, report cards, and standardized assessments (e.g., i-Ready, AimsWeb). Incoming kindergarteners are screened in spring.

*Methods:*

- Push-in lessons and career exploration activities
- If challenges arise, teachers contact parents and may refer students to the Instructional Support Team or support staff
- Ongoing communication and progress monitoring follow interventions

#### **Objective 2: Improve Attendance**

*Goal:*

Students attend school consistently unless legally excused (illness, family death, religious observance, court attendance, quarantine, or school-approved trips).

*Procedures:*

- Parents report absences to the school nurse and provide a written excuse upon return
- Absences without timely notes are marked illegal
- Attendance concerns trigger follow-ups by nurse, counselor, social worker, and administrators
- Letters and meetings address excessive absences; persistent issues may lead to CPS reports or retention

### **Objective 3: Address Academic, Behavioral, or Adjustment Concerns**

#### *Goal:*

Students facing challenges improve participation, classwork, and homework through targeted interventions.

#### *Methods:*

- Teacher collaboration with parents and support staff to develop plans
- Use of Rtl strategies, team meetings, and counseling services
- Coordination with outside agencies when needed
- Regular progress monitoring and communication

### **Objective 4: Promote Personal Safety Awareness**

#### *Goal:*

Students recognize safe and unsafe situations and know which adults to contact if they feel unsafe.

#### *Methods:*

- Developmentally appropriate lessons on abuse prevention, online safety, and substance abuse

### **Objective 5: Encourage Parental Involvement**

#### *Goal:*

Provide varied opportunities for parents to engage in their child's academic, behavioral, and social-emotional development.

#### *Methods:*

- Events such as Back to School Night and Parent University
- Participation in committees, surveys, team meetings, and workshops

### **K–5 School Social Workers**

Social workers collaborate with teachers, families, and students to support social-emotional and behavioral needs, assist with attendance, and conduct family outreach.

## **Counseling Publications**

Each year, the Counseling Department updates several key publications to support students and families. Current information on guidance activities, counselor assignments, evening sessions, and scholarship opportunities is available on the Levittown School District's High School and Middle School counseling webpages. These pages also provide links to important resources such as college admission testing, scholarship databases, and college search tools.

Available in the guidance office are:

- **Academic Course Catalog:** Detailed course information for General Douglas MacArthur and Division Avenue High Schools
- **College Planning Packet:** Essential guidance on the college application process

- **Guidance Portfolio:** A comprehensive overview of key high school information

All publications are reviewed and updated annually by the Counseling Department in collaboration with administrative staff. The counseling websites are also regularly maintained to ensure up-to-date information.
